Listen! Them Roomers Are Floatin' Again!
It seems like every few years there breaks out, as regular as the seven-year itch, (which is not very regular) a rash of stories about somebody catching a 12-inch bluegill some place.
The funny thing is that you never see the evidence, spite of the fact that there have been standing offers totaling \$15 to anyone who will show a 12-inch bluegill which was legitimately caught in Berrien county. Clear lake at Buchanan is the source alleged most often.

Anyway only last Thursday Bill Sullivan reported that his six or seven year standing offer is still good—that he will not only give \$5 to the person bringing in a 12-inch specimen—but will pay \$5 for everyone brought in, number unlimited. In other words—Bill doesn't think there is a 12-inch bluegill in Berrien county.

Rampant Auto Mows Path Down Front St. Hill

East Front street, once the pioneer's favorite for winter coasting, saw some lurid coasting in the modern manner when an auto went out of control and coasted wildly for some 300 feet down the south side of the street at 1:20 a. m. Monday.

Luman Granger, 302 Days' avenue, was entering town via East Front street, with Jack Runyan as passenger. Granger estimated that his car was traveling 45 miles an hour. At the curve at the top of the hill the car went out of control, leaving the pavement and romping madly down the north side of the street without obstacle until it hit and mowed down an electric light pole, speeding merrily on its way. It next mowed down a railway crossing sign, then another light pole, then a factory entrance sign, thence 56 feet further west, where it straddled the fence in front of the Charles Dodge home mowing down the wire and breaking off a cement post, finally coming to a stop in the drive-way of the Dodge residence.

The police and Swen's ambulance were called. The two young men were taken to Pawating hospital—Granger had 12 stitches under his left eye and treatment for multiple body bruises. Runyan had seven stitches taken to close cuts in his scalp and left hand.

While the auto was mowing its swath, it did not come off whole. Left behind were both doors, both front fenders, the windshield, the rear right fender and paneling and the left front wheel. The car was a 1954 Chevrolet convertible. A charge of reckless driving was issued against Granger.

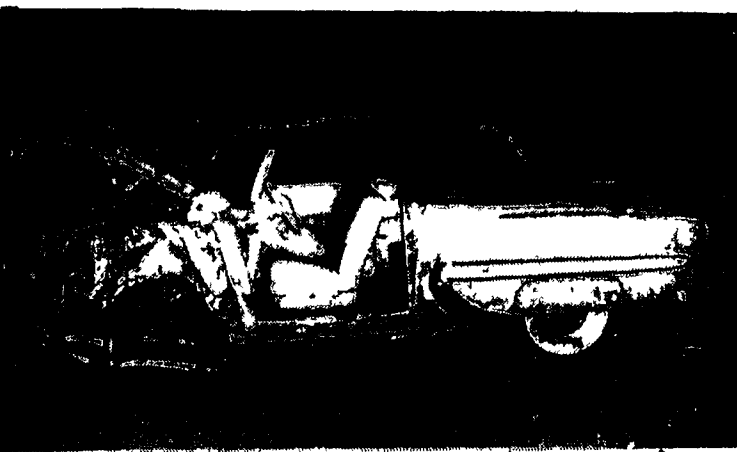
The WLS program was of much better than average quality, and the free amusement rides were getting heavy play.

Lions, J.C.'s, Legion Work For Grid Press Box

Plans have been initiated by the Buchanan Lions Club for the construction of a combined press box and concession building at the top center of the high school football stadium, replacing the wooden "shacks" which have hitherto served those purposes.

The plans call for a two-story brick structure with dimensions of 8x31 feet. The first floor will consist of two concession stands at either end, with an arch through the center to the middle aisle of the stadium.

The upper unit will be the press box. Facing the field will be seven 48x36 panes of glass tilted at a 20-degree angle, so that an approximate right-angle view of the playing field will be secured. There will be an 18-inch overhang of the roof to conform with the style of the building.

The estimated cost of the structure is \$2,400, with most of the work to be donated with the exception of the laying of the brick. Clyde Lomaugh is chairman for the committee in charge.

Associated with the Lions club in raising funds are the members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, who are sponsoring a Donkey Softball game with the Lions Club on Sept. 2. The Lions and the American Legion plan a minstrel show as a benefit in October. All other organizations who can adapt their programs to it are invited to join in fund-raising projects to finance the building.

Initiate Special Drive For Polio Emergency Fund

A special drive for polio funds, initiated by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, is being set in motion this week by Donald Roti Roti, a member of the county council of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, and Philip Hanlin, the Buchanan chairman for the regular 1954 January drive.

The start of the drive was delayed here because of the absence of the county chairman. The local chairman state that they are planning to mail letters to each home, with instructions that would be donors may send their contributions to Philip Hanlin. Cannisters will also be placed in stores.

The drive was scheduled for Aug. 16 to Aug. 31, with a national goal of \$20,000,000. 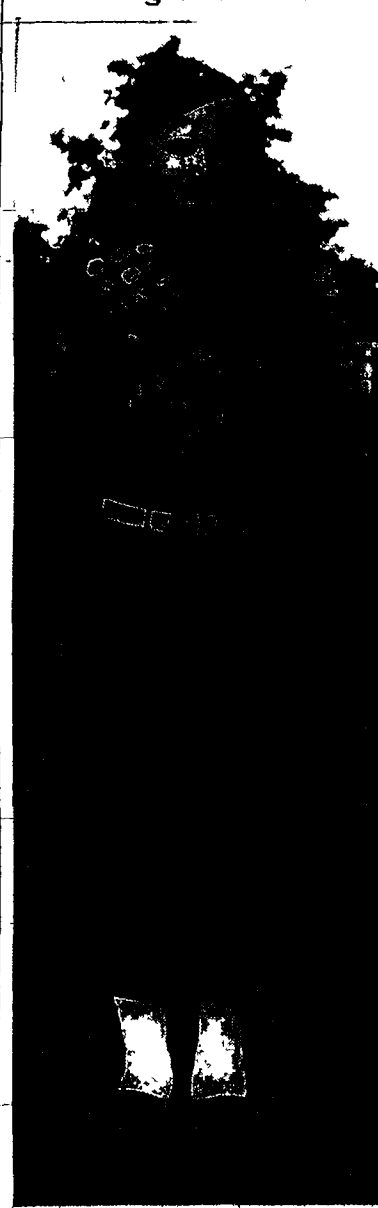

Court house round-up

ST. JOSEPH, Mich. The sordid details of a story which made even the most calloused witnesses to man's seemingly incessant inhumanity to man blurt twice came out in a Berrien circuit court hearing this week.

The story was about a 11-year-old farm worker who had molested his 12-year-old step-daughter caught in the act by his wife, the mother of the girl, the man fled from the house only to be arrested by sheriff's deputies later on.

complaint of the wife and mother. In deference to the girl, the "Roundup" will not use names in relating the story which came out when the step-father appeared before Circuit Judge Thomas N. Robinson, Sr. for sentencing on a 1st felony charge.

"I can have little sympathy for the likes of you," growled Judge Robinson as the step-father, who had previously pleaded guilty to the charge, stepped before him for sentence. Robinson sent him to

prison for 10 to 25 years.

While Judge Robinson and Judge Hatfield are enemies this fall in the circuit judge race, at least they were on the same team in one respect this week.

They were co-defendants in a \$123,000 damage suit filed in Federal Court in Grand Rapids. The suit was the latest attempt by Attorney Edward J. Kenney of Benton Harbor to recover damages for what he contends was his illegal commitment to the Kalamazoo State hospital in 1950.

Kinney's latest suit charges that Judge Robinson, then a practicing attorney in Benton Harbor, induced Chief Deputy William Pugh of the Sheriff's department to sign commitment petitions. It further alleges that Judge Robinson improperly influenced two state psychiatrists who examined Kinney prior to the commitment.

Circuit Judge Lucien Sweet of Kalamazoo ruled last May that Kinney had been committed illegally and that the commitment petitions, prepared by Robinson, were full of "conclusions." Judge Robinson commented this week that he has never conceded that the petitions were invalid, despite the Sweet ruling.

The probate court made news in another way this week, also. Webster Sterling, judge of the Benton Harbor municipal court, jumped into the race for probate judge a full two years before the next probate election comes up. Win or lose in the circuit judge race, Hatfield's probate term has another two years to run.

Sterling, who has held the city court bench since 1946, came within a whisper of beating Hatfield out for the probate job when the two tangled in a battle of the ballots in 1948. He says he has long nurtured the ambition to be probate judge. He is the son of the late John J. Sterling, one-time mayor of Benton Harbor and a nationally known trial lawyer.

Judge Sterling's early leap into the 1956 probate race was interpreted as an attempt to jockey into an advantageous position politically over other candidates who might be considering similar action.

Because of his showing against Hatfield two years ago, Sterling is reported to feel other candi-

dates might think twice before coming out in opposition to him. It also is said to capitalize on the assumption that Hatfield, because he is seeking election to the circuit court bench this fall, is no longer interested in holding onto his present job. A correlated assumption is that Hatfield's candidacy for the circuit court, if he loses, will hurt his chances for reelection as probate judge should he try two years hence.

At any rate, politically rabid Berrien county is running true to form. Before the 1951 elections are even settled, the races for the 1956 elections are already shaping up. It makes good news copy anyway.

Berrien county's resilient chairman of the board of supervisors, Frank A. Small, is bouncing back this week after a bout with the hospital last week.

He was ordered confined to Memorial hospital in St. Joseph for observation the day before the board was to meet for its regular August session. Vice chairman William Wright of Niles presided in his place.

Small's physician said merely he wanted the hefty board chairman to take a precautionary rest against a heart condition. Small had been ill a couple of days before, but the physician declined to say definitely that he had had a heart attack.

Chairman Small returned home last Friday after nearly a week of hospital "rest."

He said he was feeling good again but is "still taking it easy."

"I can go out now if I have to," says Small, "but I haven't been doing much of it and I won't for another week or so."

Doris Jones stated that while she was spending several days at the home of Betha Avance, Herring had called her up and asked permission to come and see her. When he was refused, he went to the Avance home, said Miss Jones, and entered without permission. In the room in addition to Miss Jones were Mrs. Mildred Grey of Niles, and her 4-year-old daughter.

It was alleged by Miss Jones that Herring demanded that she go outside with him. When she refused, he pulled up the front of his shirt and showed her a 32-caliber revolver, threatening to kill her unless she went out with him. While he talked, said Miss Jones, he was handling the revolver. He then went outside and said that he would wait there, and that if she tried to get away he would kill her.

Battle Looms For November

Both parties expect a tough battle before the election. Both are preparing for it.

A Democratic leader, while predicting victory for his group, says, "You can't expect the GOP to not become heavily involved in a campaign affecting the senator who is head of the national Republican policy committee. They will be in there pitching with all they have."

Republicans are well aware that the popularity of G. Mennen Williams and the relative heavy Democratic vote in the primary spell out a serious problem for them in November.

Importance of the senatorial race can hardly be overemphasized.

Last week Senator Homer Ferguson announced that President Eisenhower will appear in Michigan sometime before the election. This, of course, will be designed to aid his campaign. Ferguson and other GOP candidates are expected to make the fullest possible use of Eisenhower's popular appeal.

Drew Pearson, in his Washington column, predicts that if Ferguson is re-elected by "a wide enough margin," he will be named Senate majority leader.

The oft-repeated charge that Ferguson has support from Hoffa and the AFL because he was instrumental in calling off a Congressional investigation of the teamsters by Representative Clare Hoffman is denied emphatically.

A state Republican spokesman agrees that the investigation was called off but places responsibility on "high officials including a Democrat from other states" who were worried that it would spread from Michigan to areas that would embarrass them.

The farm vote is taking on an unusual importance.

Democrats are sure they see a trend in rural areas in their favor.

The CIO, strongly behind Phil Hart for lieutenant governor, has but little choice when it comes to a senatorial candidate. With Moody out, they are forced to embrace, however reluctantly, Patrick V. McNamara. McNamara's AFL background seems to preclude an enthusiastic support.

The CIO expects to campaign for the farm vote. They will make a big play at Michigan fairs. They will work from tents with speeches, arguments why the farmer should go Democrat, and reams of literature to help him remember their best points. This action started at the Ionia Free Fair and will continue at Mason, Traverse City, Charlotte, Cadillac, Allegan, Saginaw, Adrian and Hillsdale.

But farmers will be reminded of what happened to them because of the recent milk strike in Detroit. GOP campaigners will point to the cut dairy farmers accepted several months back so that the price of milk could be reduced 1 cent per quart to consumers. They will then describe the Detroit strike which ended in higher pay for the unionized delivery men and higher cost for the consumer.

"How can the CIO expect to win farm votes when they pull this sort of thing?" asked one Republican worker.

Best way to win the election, say Republicans, is to build up a heavy outstate vote. By rough figures, they compute that there were 275,000 Democratic votes cast in Wayne county to 111,000 Republican. But in the rural areas there were 349,000 Republican votes compared to 86,000 Democratic.

An important reason for the heavy Democrat vote in Wayne, they say, is the hot campaign to elect Hart over Fitzgerald. They believe many GOP voters will appear in the fall election.

Biggest worry for Democrats is what will happen to the primary vote for Fitzgerald.

The Williams camp made it clear that they had no objection to Fitzgerald because he was backed by the Teamsters Union.

They considered him a poor party man. While anxious not to chase away any votes, they claim they have no plans for overtures to the Hoffa group nor have they received any.

The Williams group does not like to think about the possibility, however remote, that many of Fitzgerald's votes will switch to GOP.

Republicans think that most Democrat campaigning will boost Gov. Williams, that McNamara and Hart will be little more than coattail riders.

Important test for GOP will come at their convention. Can party unity be maintained? There have been indications that the best way to do this is to rename the incumbents. Brake for treasurer, Martin for auditor general, Cleary for secretary of state, Millard for attorney general.

This won't satisfy everyone, of course. The upper peninsula wants to be represented in the ticket. If this happens, some incumbent would have to bow out. Former senator George Higgins, who withdrew from the race for governor, has announced that he would like to be secretary of state. If Higgins can't be fitted in, what will become of him?

Conflicting reports can be found regarding the sentiments of Donald S. Leonard, successful GOP candidate for governor. On the one hand, he is said to favor the existing set-up. On the other, he is said to want a U. P. candidate for auditor general. Since Frank G. Millard, attorney general, is unpopular in rural areas because of some of his decisions regarding township government, he appears to be on shakiest ground. There are rumors of plans to shift Martin to Millard's position to Leonard's wishes. Then a U. P. candidate could be picked for auditor general.

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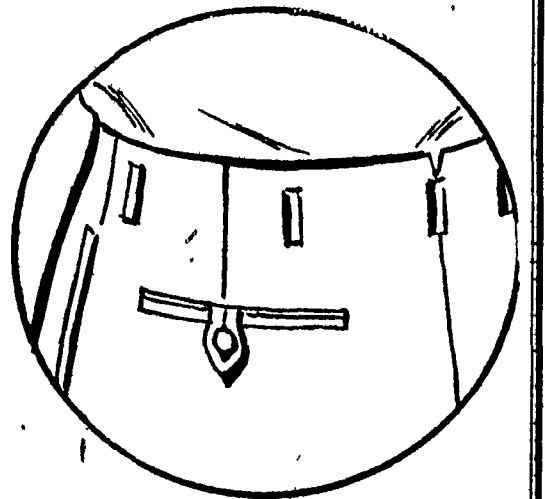

Now They Milk Cows With Tractor

When lightning knocks out your electricity the cows still have to be milked. But now you can use your tractor to do the job, reveals J. P. Hoekzema, Berrien county agricultural agent.

The cost is very little to make your tractor a substitute milker motor, but it's not the type of change you can make on a moment's notice, warns Hoekzema. The set-up needs an extra stalk-cock to put in place of the manifold plug and a length of hose to run from the tractor to the vacuum line. But not all tractors

will have the manifold plug and it may have to be drilled and tapped. There are some precautions that farmers should take, notes Robert G. White, Michigan State College extension agricultural engineer. The stalkcock should be opened slowly as the sudden demand for vacuum may stall the engine. The stalkcock should be closed when

starting the tractor.

The tractor should run at a slow engine speed, as it develops more vacuum. Keep a watchful eye on the vacuum gauge on the milker line. Usually a tractor will have 18 to 22 pounds of vacuum, that's too much, only 10 to 16 are needed. The vacuum tank should not be by-passed. Just connect the

tractor to the tank, it makes the milker run smoother.

Equipment dealers in Berrien county may have the necessary connections for this "tractor milker." Ask at the county extension office for details.

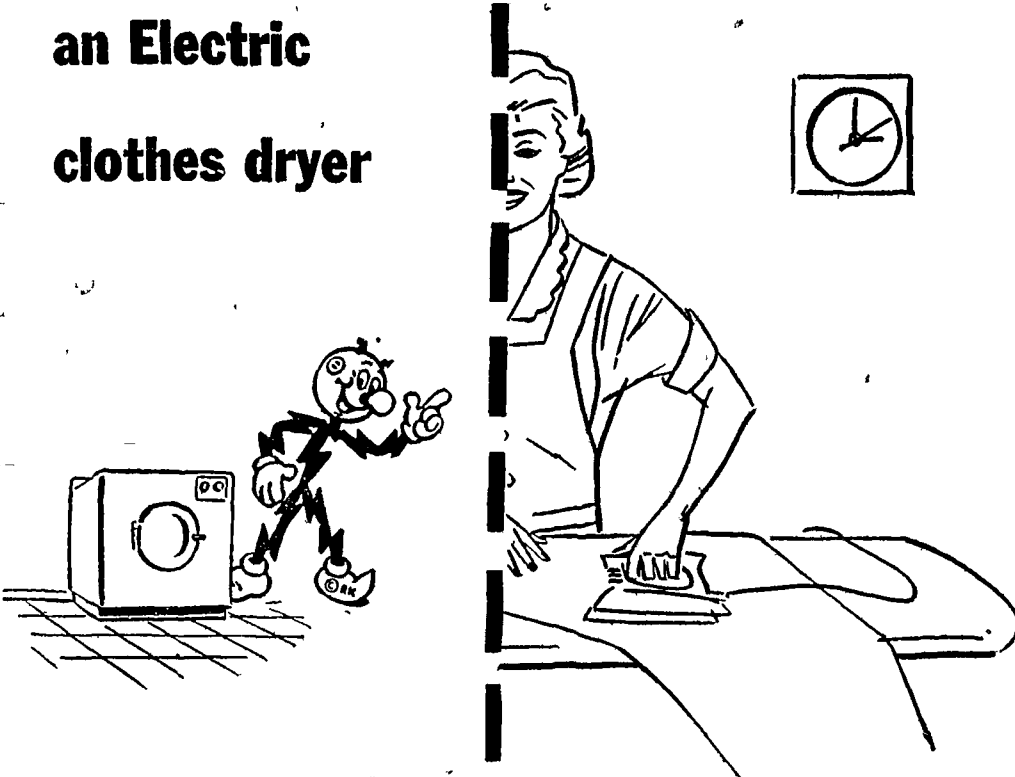

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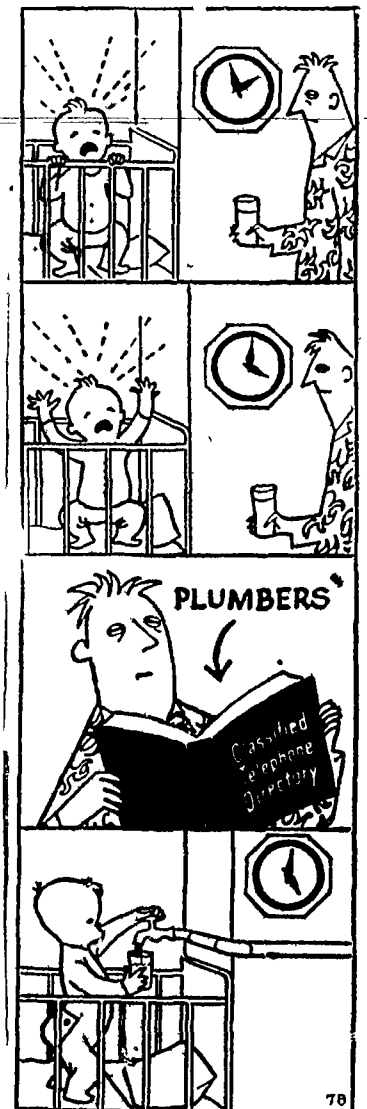

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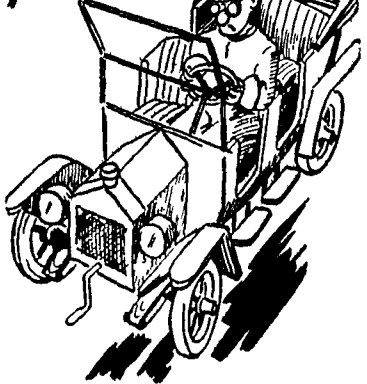

Russell Wright Has High Herd In County

The North Berrien Dairy Herd Improvement Association had the highest average production for all the herds as these herds had an average of 35.8 pounds of butterfat. The high cow in the three associations was one from the South Association. This was "Kate", a registered Guernsey, owned by Ed Healy of Niles, who produced 119 pounds of butterfat. Two cows tied for high milk production each producing 2260 pounds during the month of July. Clymer Just Cuts Hair In Former Political Hdq.

This week we give you Mr. G. W. Clymer, owner and operator of the Star Barber Shop, 111 E. Front street. Here you see the barber playing his tonsorial arts on the head of Master Mike Chubb, 7-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Chubb, living 2 miles southwest of Buchanan.

Mr. Clymer learned his trade at a Tanners' System Barber's College in South Bend. On graduation in 1936, he was employed in a barber shop in Eau Claire for a year. Then he had a chair in the Four Flags Hotel for 7

years, until 1944. Then Clymer jumped off the dock into his own business in Buchanan. He bought the equipment of the Star Barber Shop here from Ted Rouse in 1944, and has operated continuously there since.

This room has held a barber shop many years. Before the turn of the century the two small rooms occupied by the Woodworth Insurance agency and the Star Barber Shop were all one room. Then the division was installed and a jewelry store was installed where the Star Barber Shop now is, and a barber shop where the Woodworth agency now is, with Sunday & Boone in charge. Shortly afterward Fred Mead bought the business and transferred the barber shop where it now is. It was then that it bloomed into a sort of



combined police station and political ward headquarters, with so much of the serious and the non-sensical stirred up that which could not be told from which

For quite a spell while Ed Mitchell was chief of police, the barber shop was also the village, later the city, police headquarters, consisting of a small table or desk with a telephone on it paid by the city.

When Fred died in 1938 Ted Rouse bought the shop and gave it the name of the Star Barber Shop, which he sold to Mr. Clymer. It's different now. He bought the shop as a place to operate a barber's business and puts in his time in administering shaves and haircuts to his clients. Clymer is a man of quiet tastes. When he locks the door at night he goes to his home in Niles and spends the evenings with his family. He was married in 1937 and he and his wife have three children: Larry, 16, Cheryl, 14, Denny, 11. All attend the Niles schools, with Larry in the 10th grade, Cheryl in the 9th, and Denny in the 6th. He and his wife belong to no organizations.

Mr. Clymer's only interest outside of his home is fishing. In his quiet and orderly way he does practically all his fishing in one place—Smith Lake, 8 miles north of Niles on Pucker Street Road. That, in these flamboyant days, is a rather unusually quiet and orderly way of living.
