Moccasin Court Housing For Sale; Bids Asked

Starting Thursday, Sept. 2, with the appearance of an official advertisement by the Housing & Home Finance Agency of the Public Housing Administration, the preliminary steps in the sale of housing units of the Moccasin Court project in Buchanan have been initiated.

The structures will be open to bids, during a period beginning Sept. 2 and ending on Oct. 5, 1954, when the bids may be opened by the government. Each bid must be accompanied by a money order, certified check, or cashier's check to the extent of 10% of the bid, certifying that the bidder will not withdraw his offer within 60 days after the final date of delivery of offers Oct. 5. The money orders or checks of unsuccessful bidders will be returned at the end of the 60-day period.

Other terms and the address to which the bids may be sent are included in the legal advertisement elsewhere in this issue.

The government has set no minimum price on the units, all going to the highest bidder. A potential buyer may bid on any or all units, while limiting the number of acceptances he will make.

The successful bidder must remove any unit he is sold within 120 calendar days after the date of written notification by the government to proceed with such removal.

Reports Payment Of 84% City Tax

Mrs. Esther Hamilton, city treasurer, reports that as of Tuesday, Aug. 31, a total of \$100,025 of the city taxes had been collected, or approximately 84% of the total roll of \$119,009.

The last penalty-free date of payment is Sept. 10, 1954. A penalty of 1% will be added after that date, and an added 1/2 of 1% will be added each month thereafter until the taxes are paid.

Quantity Large Quality Short, Says BHS Coach

There is a good turnout in numbers for the 1954 grid season at the Buchanan high school, with about 55 suits issued, but the material for a victorious football team in any such aggregation as the Big Four, is not at all plentiful, states Bill Billings, starting his first week of coaching in Buchanan.

A main difficulty is that there is not enough depth in terms of first-string material, states Billings. There are indeed 11 prospects who might be shaped into a fair team or even into a very good team, but at the present time replacement material is scarce.

However, said Coach Billings, he has only spent two days with his material and will be able to report more definitely on the nature and prospects of the grid timber at his disposal later.

Bailey Releases Cost Book Rental In 8 Grades

Assistant Superintendent Pierre Bailey is releasing information on the cost of rental books to parents of grade school students for the first year of the rental arrangement.

The basis for charge is the original cost of the book plus 10%, to be rented at 25% of that total per year on the estimate of an average 4-year life per book. The entire cost this year will be \$3.50 to parents and pupils of grades 1 through 8.

Cost of the rentals and of the total of rentals plus supplies in each of the 8 grades throughout the year will be 1st grade, rental 7 books \$1.55, total \$6.35; 2nd grade, 5 rentals \$1.65, total \$6.65; 3rd grade, 6 rentals \$2.35, total \$9.45; 4th grade, 7 rentals \$3.15, total \$12.60; 5th grade, 7 rentals \$3.50, total \$14.20; 6th grade, 7 rentals \$3.60, total \$14.70; 7th grade, 4 rentals \$2.15, total \$8.55; 8th grade, 5 rentals \$2.95, total \$11.90.

The cost per pupil tends to be higher through the lower grades because of the greater use of workbooks, plus the cost of the weekly reader through the first 6 grades.

There are no rental costs for kindergarten students as no books are used in that section.

Field Organizer Boys of Woodcraft Speaks To Lions

They discussed the purpose of the club which is the teaching of conservation and out-door crafts. They told that clubs are being organized in surrounding towns and that plans are being made to start a club in Buchanan.

Student Driving Held Only After School Hours

Details of the student driving classes in the Buchanan schools are not entirely completed, stated Earl Rizor, instructor, Monday.

However, it has been decided that the course will be taught entirely after school hours and on Saturdays. Rizor stated that he expected to devote two hours daily after school to the course, plus added hours Saturdays if needed to take care of all of the students applying.

The course will open with class instruction on traffic rules, safety measures in driving, "the right attitude toward other motorists and general behind-the-wheel responsibility. During actual road instruction, Rizor will take groups of four students for hourly lessons, each student to spend 15 minutes behind the wheel.

In addition to the practical application of the safety instruction in special problems, as how to correctly enter both parallel and angle parking spaces, how to stop on a hill and start again, and other beginning problems. Each student is to receive two hours of instruction in the car weekly.

Child Safety Need Urged By State Police

"Child traffic safety education is a continuing process and is the responsibility of all of us," according to Sgt. Lorenz Ahlgrim, commanding officer of the Niles post of the Michigan State Police.

Sgt. Ahlgrim offered his comment in connection with the current statewide child safety campaign being conducted by police agencies and safety groups.

"Children should be taught the rules of safety as soon as they are able to understand, but these rules must be repeatedly emphasized and kept in their minds as they grow older for they will forget and they will be careless," Sgt. Ahlgrim said. "Furthermore it is extremely important for older persons to set good examples as the children do what grownups do."

There were 100 child pedestrian deaths in Michigan in 1953 and 18 were killed riding bicycles. In addition, 3,600 children were injured.

"Most child pedestrian deaths in the 5 to 14 year age group occur in residential areas," Sgt. Ahlgrim said. "Crossing between intersections accounted for 53 per cent last year. Other frequent causes were stepping from behind parked cars and walking unsafely or playing in the roadway."

"Bicyclists lost their lives entering highways without stopping, swerving, riding double, stunting and riding at night without proper lighting equipment."

Sgt. Ahlgrim pointed out that the slogan of the campaign, "Watch Out for Kids", is directed to drivers. They are asked to remember that children often do the unexpected and they should help do their safety thinking for them. "Drivers are not always at fault in accidents, but whether they are or not does not bring back a dead child or relieve the pain of an injured one," Sgt. Ahlgrim said.

Regular class sessions will begin for all classes Thursday morning.

drive, on the alleged ground that a satisfactory structure and site was available in the Dewey Avenue school, at no cost, but that the library backers refused to even consider the offer.

Buchananites who were solicited stated that the Building Committee might have had the Dewey Avenue school building and site, or the site alone, without cost, but refused to consider the offer. In the first place the offer could have been made but it actually never was. The drive committee solicited the aid of an engineer to inspect that structure thoroughly. The inspection was made and the building was found absolutely unsuited to remodeling.

The lot on West Front street where the library is to be built was bought from William Gnodtke for \$2,100. Its dimensions are 101 3/4 feet frontage and 214 1/2 feet back. It will cost the builders much less to level this site than it would to demolish the old school, get rid of the rubble and fill the basement.

But that is not the main consideration, which actually is. The Library Drive committee and the Buchanan Library Board had been in full agreement that the Front street site was the best available on the grounds of position and convenience to patrons. It is a first consideration in all public library building that a central position in town is desirable. The traveling library inspector from the State Library department checked on the local arrangements and had only one complaint to make: that the lot bought from Gnodtke is too far from the business center of town. The board defended its selection by saying that it was as near as they could get.

In the selection of a library site these days, the "go by" business is just as important as it is to a store. A commanding spot where it cannot help but be seen by all traffic possible, is desirable. Libraries, like businesses, today need advertising because the library has too much competition. It must be where it may be seen by people, and its appearance must be such to attract, to lure the people who see it. Stick it in a side or back room and the public — or too many of the public — will rate it back-room stuff.

The Library Drive committee and the Library Board could possibly make some errors. But they are not wrong in the site selected.

James Best, a native of Gahen and a resident of this area nearly all of his life, died suddenly near his home on Mayflower Road, about 3 miles from Buchanan, about 9 a. m. Thursday, Aug. 26, 1954.

He had apparently started for his employment as a clerk in the Gamble store, and had driven along the driveway entrance to his home almost to the Mayflower Road when apparently he felt ill and got out of the car, starting on foot to his home, when he fell dead in the driveway. He was seen by the driver of a Cassopolis oil truck.

James has been seriously ill with heart trouble for many years, but had continued his work courageously, the state of his health being known to few. He was born July 26, 1896, the son of James and Emaline Best. He was educated in the Weesaw township schools and later served in World War I, being enroute by ship to Europe when the Armistice was declared Nov. 11, 1918.

He had been a worker in and manager of stores most of his adult life. He was employed a few years in grocery stores in Dowagiac, and for a time as manager of the National Food store in Buchanan.

He had been employed in the Gamble store in Buchanan since 1941, managing their store while the owners, William and George Sullivan, were in military service during World War II.

He was also very active in the Reorganized Church of the Latter Day Saints, having been an elder of that denomination many years.

While he was at Dowagiac, he served as the leader of a Boy Scout troop. But because of growing ill health he was obliged to drop the work.

He is survived by a foster son, Dean Hartoff, who made his home with him. All his life he had been interested in boys and contributed much to their welfare. He was an honorary member of the New Buffalo Rod & Gun club.

He is survived by the following sisters and brothers: Mrs. Bertha Hanover and Mrs. Arthur Metzger of Buchanan, Mrs. Emma Brown of Niles, Mrs. Vaughn Rishel of South Bend, Alva Best of New Carlisle, Guy of New Buffalo, and Denny of Three Oaks.

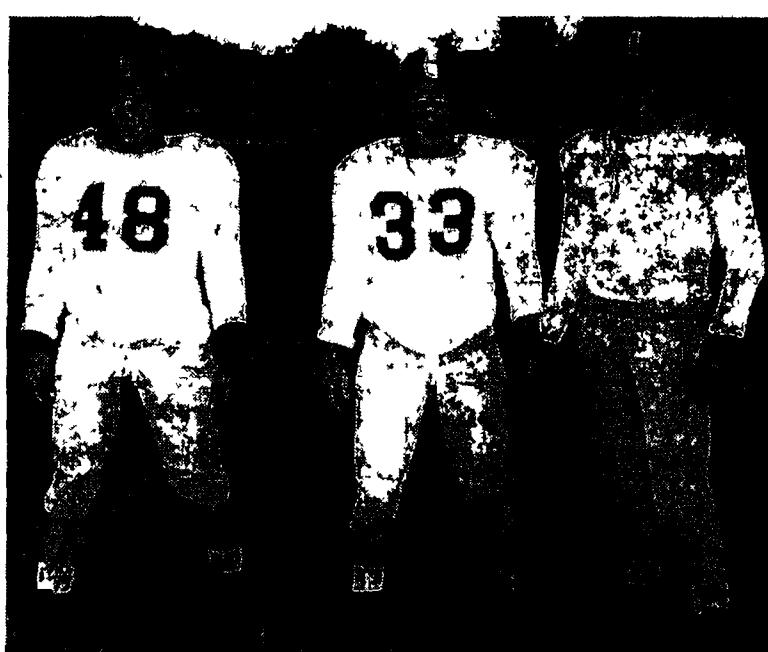

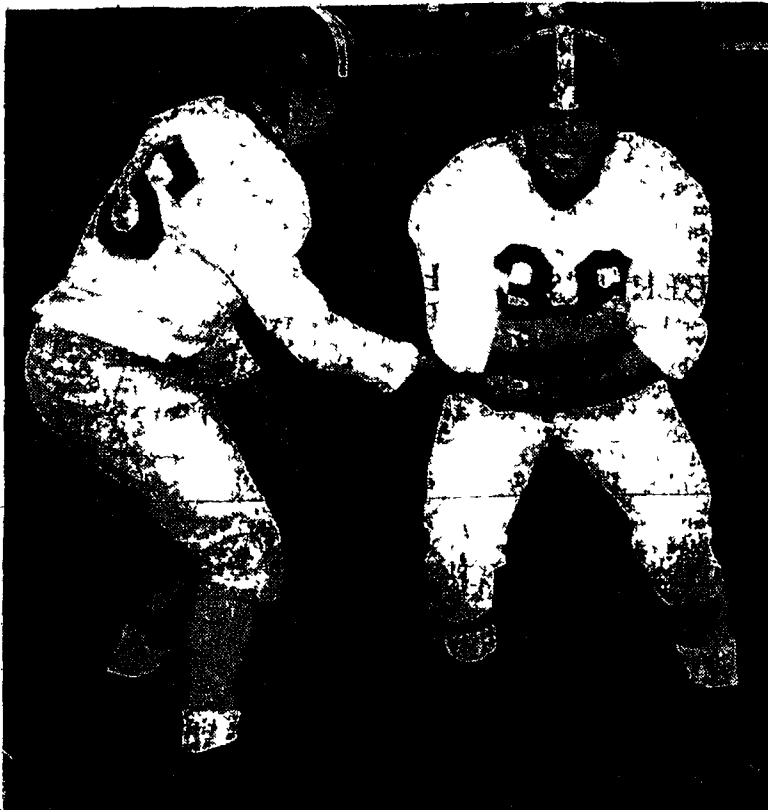

Gives Library \$15,000 For Double Memorial

Doubtless the most interesting story connected with the campaign for the new Buchanan library home is the story of the "Archives Room." The interest of the room lies not only in what it is to be, but how and through whom it came about.

When the movement for the new building was very young it received two very encouraging lifts. The first was the endowment of \$20,000 by the Clark Equipment company. The second "lift," with which this story deals, was the very generous gift by Mrs. F. E. Newberry of \$15,000 for a joint memorial to her father, the late George Hanley, and her husband, the late F. E. Newberry.

It was agreed that this endowment should go to a special feature of the library, "The Archives Room." Though this may seem a novel use to those not familiar with the development of modern libraries, the "Archives Room" is actually designed to take care of several new movements rapidly becoming universal in libraries which can find a room for them in present quarters, or which are building new homes.

The Archives Room in the Buchanan library will serve the purpose which the title implies — it will house the records of the past. These include the 15-year file of the Berrien County Record, now owned by the library; all of the special books on local and Michigan history which the library has secured as gifts or on loan; the scrapbooks on local history, also to an extent the records of the City of Buchanan, which are in themselves a valuable source of local history.

There will be at once a movement to secure "microfilm" copies of the older files from 1869 to 1908 and from 1927 to 1938, which the library does not have. These microfilms are miniature pictures on a film roll about an inch or less wide and long enough to include an entire year's issue, which winds on a spool and slips into a container about four inches square. Then a mechanical reproducer shows this back in any size desired, reproducing a newspaper page in original size, or sections in greatly magnified size. These microfilms of newspapers are swiftly becoming universal — they are miraculously inexpensive, the main cost being for the mechanical enlarger.

They have two main purposes: 1. Saving space, 2. Saving precious old newspaper files, going back 85 years in Buchanan and 120 years in Niles, which are now rapidly deteriorating. As they accumulate, city records can be preserved endlessly by microfilm.

This Archives Room should induce people who have old journals or pioneer letters to give them to the library. The new room will be perfectly fireproof. The quarters cannot become a museum because of lack of size, but items of great historical significance that do not take up space may be housed there, if considered suitable by the library board.

The Archives Room will also

be very well suited for housing a library of record music. This is the ambition of every library today, but very many of them are limited by the lack of sound-proof quarters where they can be played. This will be possible in the Archives Room, which will be separated entirely from the library reading rooms by a distance of about 12 feet, to be occupied by the main entrance and the library work room.

The Archives Room will also house the Jesse East collection of old Buchanan pictures. It may contain a film library and projector.

In it also will be fitting acknowledgment of the gift by Mrs. Newberry and the persons memorialized.

George Hanley

George Hanley died at his home on 204 West Front street on June 17, 1937, at the age of 83 years. He was the last survivor of Buchanan's veterans of the Civil War. Mrs. Newberry

was his third and only living child. He was born in New York state, grew up in Ohio, entered the Union Army there as a boy of 17, and came to Buchanan shortly after the close of the Civil War. Here he married Matilda Brocius and remained here the rest of his life, moving to Buchanan about 30 years before his death.

He served during the entire war, rising to the rank of sergeant and passing miraculously through the bloodiest campaigns. He fought in defense of the city of Washington during the first years of the war, and he went through the bloodiest series of battles known as the Peninsular Campaign when Grant was gradually hedging in the forces of Lee.

His unit was in the apex of the charge that finally broke through Lee's lines on April 3, 1865.

His unit was in sight of the McLean farm house when General Lee approached with a detachment carrying a white flag. Hanley's unit remained while Grant joined Lee at the McLean farm and the terms of surrender were signed.

Sgt. Hanley remained in Richmond several weeks. Daily General Lee used to ride his famous horse, Traveler, down to water at a street near Hanley's camp, where Lee would stop and talk with the Union men. Then Hanley was transferred to a camp in West Virginia for several months and was finally discharged the late summer of 1865. On his return to Ohio he heard of opportunities to work at Buchanan and came here, to remain the rest of his life.

F. E. Newberry

Most Buchanan people became acquainted with Mr. Newberry when he came to Buchanan to make his home following his retirement from business in 1928.

His wife, Mrs. Newberry, was, of course, a native and they had been here many many times to visit her parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Hanley.

But Newberry had had a long and distinguished career during the 40 years before he came here to live. He was a native of England and grew up there, graduating from the London Technical School of Engineering. He came to the United States in 1888, when a young man. After working in several cities as an electrical engineer he founded a business for himself in St. Louis, for the engineering and installment of electrical equipment in public and private businesses.

His business grew rapidly; he opened branch offices through the Southwest and West. When he disposed of his business in 1928,

one of his offices maintained the name, the F. E. Newberry Electrical company, then and now, one of the largest on the Pacific coast.

Those who were fortunate enough to know him here remember him as a most interesting companion with a wide experience, a brilliant mind and a depth of human knowledge and discernment.

He died June 18, 1950.

Men In Service

Richard Higginbotham Trained As Army Field Wireman
Camp Chaffee, Ark., Aug. 26—Pvt. Richard Higginbotham, son of Mr. and Mrs. Orvel Higginbotham, Rt. 1, Buchanan, has been selected to attend the 5th Armored Division Field Wireman School.

During the 8-week course, Higginbotham will be trained in the installation and maintenance of military field wire communications systems and the operation of field telephone switchboards. Part of the course will be devoted to practical work in pole climbing techniques and in laying communication wire under simulated combat conditions.

Court house round-up

ST. JOSEPH, Mich.—Berrien county's governmental general staff has decided there must be something to the old military principle of "divide and conquer."

They are hoping the principle will be a principal factor in winning approval at the polls this November of the once-defeated proposal to raise \$2,500,000 in extra taxes to finance construction of a new county building and a new county infirmary.

Members of a joint committee spearheading the board's twin construction projects agreed at a meeting in the court house this week to submit, "divide and conquer" a plan for the full board's approval at its regular Sept. 13 meeting.

The new plan would give the voter come November 2, the privilege of voting on both the county building and the infirmary as separate \$1,250,000 projects. The proposal defeated at the primary

polls in August simply gave the voter a yes-or-no choice on both projects as a single ballot unit.

Committee chairman, Alfred Bartz, of Lincoln township, is convinced that standing alone, both projects would have had a better chance of winning in August. Adherents of the "divide and conquer" move, of which Bartz is now one, contend voters reacted in August to the joint proposal like a child reacts to bad medicine. They felt the projects were being jammed down their throats.

But supervisors are by tradition as persistent as Bruce's spider. If once they don't succeed at getting construction project approved at the polls, you can bet they'll try and try again until they do get it.

Berrien county's republican sheriff, Erwin H. Kubath, and Michigan's democrat governor, G. Mennen Williams, have little or no use

for each other's political hide.

But Kubath this week carried to the sheriff's committee of the board of supervisors, the governor's request for the board to appropriate money for extra police patrols on Berrien county highways over the Labor Day week end.

Seems there's no political argument over the necessity of making the highways as safe as possible, especially at a time when hundreds of thousands of motorists are out for their last fling of the summer under Michigan's vacation land skies.

Berrien, with its bigger-than-average sheriff's patrol and its state police posts at Niles and New Buffalo, was not on the list of Michigan counties getting national guardsmen assigned to its highways at the governor's call.

However, Supervisor Sheridan Cook of Niles, chairman of the sheriff's committee, agreed to call the committee into session this week to consider what additional steps could be taken.

Kubath already had the help of the Blossomland amateur radio association lined up for traffic control duties over the week end. Presumably, Cook's committee will be asked to underwrite whatever costs might be involved.

The sheriff said the "ham" operators had offered the use of 11 radio equipped cars for duty over the holiday. He quoted Robert Hatch, president of the "ham" association, as saying 22 amateur radio operators would be provided to staff the cars.

Kubath said the group will be deputized for the week end and will have full police powers on the highways while on patrol. He said the 11 "ham" cars will more than triple the highway patrol his department at its present maximum strength could muster.

As Berrien county superintendent of schools, Beryl S. Dornay is charged with the responsibility of looking after the health of the thousands of rural and suburban school children in the county as well as their academic progress.

Dornay added two new names to his staff roster this week to assist in that job. The new school nurses are Miss Edna Greiger, a former member of Mercy hospital's medical staff in Benton Harbor, and Miss Marjorie Nametz, former Benton township school nurse.

The two succeed Mrs. Hope Bowen, who left this year because of failing health, and Miss Marjorie Bouws, who returned to school for graduate work this semester.

Berrien county's sheriff's posse, which makes a big splash at such events as the annual Berrien Youth Fair and the Blossomtime parade in the twin cities, astir their colorful steeds, put on a real "ride 'em cowboy" thriller in Benton Harbor this week.

are restricted to the stock beds and the carnations, already coming on since October, then take over. Then follows in shorter intervals the Easter season flowers, and the bedding plants of summer.

He had 15 years of good experience under his father when World War II came on. After a short shift in the Army he was sent home to engage in some occupation with military priority. He found that at the Clark plant in Buchanan, where he was inspector in the axle division.

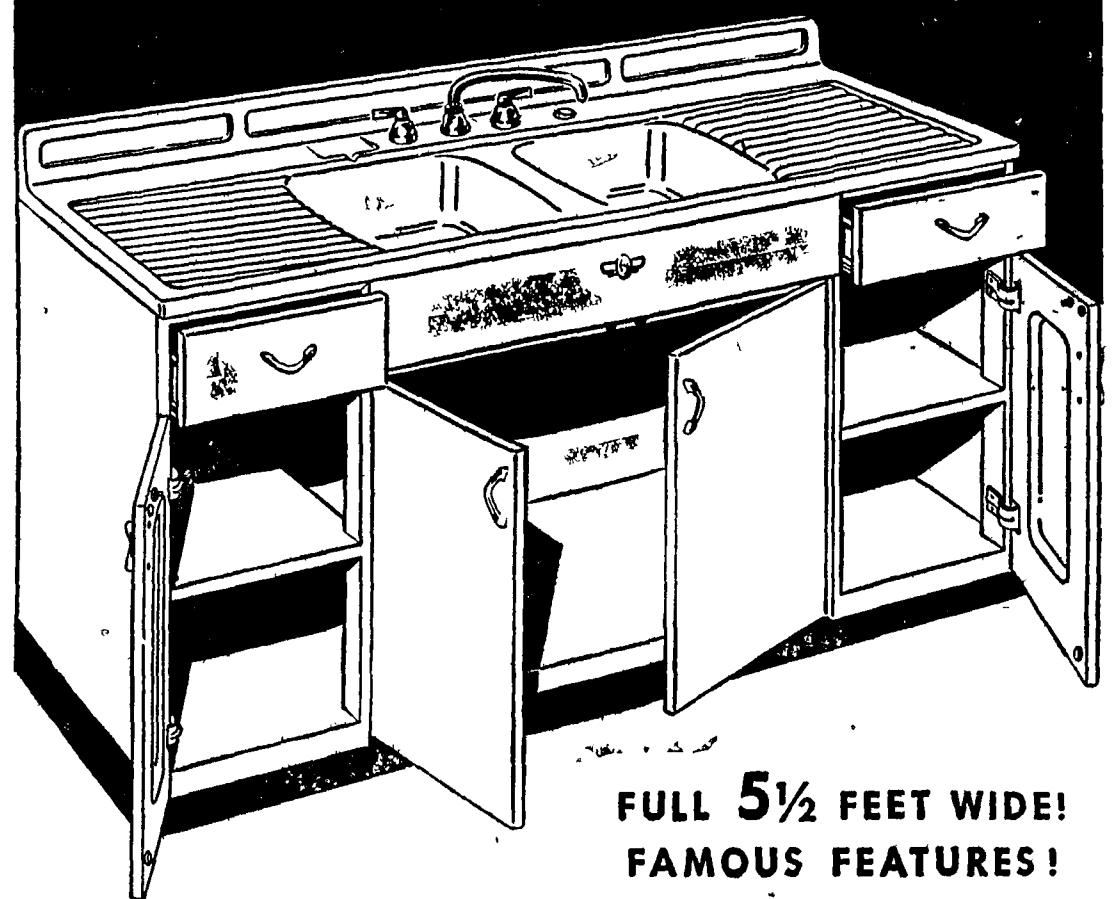
